

SERMON BULLET POINTS

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1. Identity & Authority in Christ

- Spiritual power is not found in copying others but in knowing Christ personally.
- The sons of Sceva attempted to cast out demons by invoking the name of Jesus without knowing Him personally.
- The evil spirit's response, 'Jesus I know, Paul I know—but who are you?' reveals the necessity of spiritual credibility.
- True spiritual authority is rooted in identity with Christ, not borrowed words or rituals.
- Those who walk in submission to God and alignment with Christ are recognized by both heaven and hell.

 Scripture References: Acts 19:13–16; Luke 10:19; James 4:7


2. Resurrection Power Lives in You

- Jesus demonstrated His dominion over death by raising Lazarus from the grave.
- Romans 8 teaches that the same Spirit who raised Jesus from the dead now lives inside every believer.
- Resurrection life is not just a theological idea—it's a living power within us.
- Lorene's personal testimony of being raised from the dead by Jesus underscores this truth.
- Our testimonies are weapons of victory, releasing the evidence of God's power into our situations.

 Scripture References: John 11:43–44; Romans 8:11; Revelation 12:11


3. Confronting Darkness in the Culture

- Ephesus was known for its pervasive occult influence and idol worship.
- Paul's teaching in Ephesus directly confronted spiritual deception and exposed the counterfeit.
- As revival spread, people repented by burning their magic scrolls publicly, showing complete renunciation.
- This act of public deliverance dismantled demonic power over the region.
- Genuine revival breaks out when the Gospel challenges cultural strongholds with truth and love.

 Scripture References: Acts 19:17–20; Ephesians 6:12; 2 Corinthians 10:4


4. Open the Eyes of Your Spirit

- Paul's prayer in Ephesians is not for physical needs but for spiritual vision and insight.
- Many believers live beneath their inheritance because they lack spiritual awareness.
- Just as Elisha's servant's eyes were opened to see God's armies, we too need spiritual perspective.
- God's light transforms our understanding and enables us to see reality through heaven's lens.
- Spiritual blindness leads to fear, but revelation leads to confidence and clarity.

 Scripture References: Ephesians 1:17–18; 2 Kings 6:17; 1 John 1:5


5. Union with Christ Is Your Power Source

- Believers are spiritually married to Christ, joined as one in spirit.
- The Holy Spirit dwells in our spirit fully, but we must yield our soul for Him to flow outward.
- Transformation happens as the Spirit fills our thoughts, emotions, and decisions.
- We are the temple of God—not a place He visits, but one He inhabits.
- Living from union with Christ brings peace, authority, and clarity.

 Scripture References: Ephesians 2:6; 1 Corinthians 6:17; Colossians 1:27


6. The Armor of God Is Christ Himself

- The armor of God is not symbolic alone—each piece represents an aspect of Jesus' nature.
- Truth, righteousness, peace, faith, salvation, and the Word are all found in Him.
- Putting on the armor is putting on Christ—aligning your mind, mouth, and heart with His.
- We stand firm against the enemy when we are fully clothed in this spiritual armor.
- Fear, shame, and spiritual attack lose power when we wear Christ confidently.

 Scripture References: Ephesians 6:10–18; Romans 13:12; Isaiah 54:17


7. Faith Requires Discipline and Meditation

- Faith doesn't grow through feelings—it is built through meditating on God's Word.
- God instructed Joshua to meditate day and night for success and courage.
- Lorraine emphasized scheduling time with God—ask, write, and wait for His Word.
- Speaking and declaring Scripture helps renew the mind and establish divine truth.
- Focused, intentional faith produces supernatural fruit and bold obedience.

 Scripture References: Joshua 1:8; Hebrews 11:6; Philippians 4:19


8. Reject Fear and Offense – They Open Doors

- Fear is a demonic spirit that must be actively resisted, not accommodated.
- Offense and unforgiveness give the enemy a legal right to oppress believers.
- God calls us to forgive quickly and completely—to live unoffendable.
- The spirit of fear whispers lies that shrink our confidence and cloud our minds.
- Freedom comes when we recognize, repent, and release anything that hinders faith.

 Scripture References: 2 Timothy 1:7; Romans 8:15; 2 Corinthians 2:11

9. Practical Faith – Ask, Hear, Speak, Act

- • Faith begins by asking God in faith and waiting for His specific response.
- • The Lord often answers through the Word, peace, inner knowing, or visions.
- • When God gives a Word, it must be declared and acted on persistently.
- • Writing down God's response is part of stewarding revelation and direction.
- • Faith without action is dead—belief must move your hands and feet.

 Scripture References: Matthew 7:7–8; 1 John 5:14–15; Isaiah 55:11

10. Walk in Victory – You’ve Already Won

- • You don’t fight for victory—you live from it because of Christ’s finished work.
- • We are more than conquerors and called to reign in life with boldness.
- • Discouragement and shame are lies that silence our spiritual roar.
- • The Church must arise and shine in bold identity and purpose.
- • Your position is in Christ—seated in authority, standing in power.

 Scripture References: Ephesians 6:10; Romans 8:37; Isaiah 60:1
