JESUS I KNOW
PAUL I KNOW
BUT WHO
ARE YOU

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1. Identity and Authority in Christ

Scripture Focus:

- Acts 19:11–16
- Luke 10:19
- James 4:7

Summary:

This section centres around the confrontation in Acts 19 where seven sons of Sceva try to imitate Paul's authority by casting out demons “in the name of Jesus whom Paul preaches.” The evil spirit responds with cutting clarity: “Jesus I know, Paul I know—but who are you?” The men are then violently overpowered.

This vivid moment highlights a critical truth: **authority in the spirit realm does not come from religious words—it flows from relationship.** The demons knew Jesus and Paul because both operated in legitimate heavenly authority. The sons of Sceva had no real connection to Christ and no spiritual rank. The result? Shame, defeat, and exposure.

Key Teaching Points:

- You can't outsource your spiritual authority.
- Mere formulas are powerless without intimacy with Jesus.
- The enemy recognizes those who walk in real covenant power.

Takeaway:

“Your life must speak the name of Jesus before your mouth ever does.”

2. Resurrection Power Lives in You

Scripture Focus:

- John 11:38–44
- Romans 8:11
- Revelation 12:11

Summary:

This part draws a compelling link between the resurrection of Lazarus and the believer's access to resurrection power. Just as Jesus called Lazarus out of death, that same Spirit now **dwells in those who believe**.

Lorene shares a personal, miraculous testimony of clinical death and divine resurrection, declaring: "Jesus sent me back." Her physical return to life is a prophetic picture of spiritual rebirth—awakening to purpose, power, and calling.

This section establishes the **supernatural identity of every born-again believer**: we are not merely forgiven—we are raised, seated, and authorized.

Key Teaching Points:

- Resurrection power is not just for the afterlife—it's for everyday life.
- Your testimony carries power to release breakthrough in others.
- Miracles today are proof that Jesus is alive and active.

Takeaway:

"You are not waiting for resurrection—you're walking in it."

3. Ephesus – The Clash of Kingdoms

Scripture Focus:

- Acts 19:17–20
- Ephesians 6:12
- 2 Corinthians 10:4

Summary:

Paul's ministry in Ephesus wasn't casual—it was **a full-scale spiritual invasion**. Ephesus was steeped in witchcraft, magic scrolls, incantations, and idol worship. But when revival came, people openly burned their spell books worth millions, and the Word of God spread powerfully.

The citywide deliverance that followed the failed exorcism of the sons of Sceva shows that the **name of Jesus demands fear, reverence, and alignment**. No one can dabble in darkness and walk in light.

Key Teaching Points:

- Cultural revival comes when the church demonstrates real spiritual power.
- The gospel confronts darkness, not coexists with it.
- Public repentance breaks demonic strongholds.

Takeaway:

“What was once a centre for witchcraft became ground zero for revival.”

4. Open the Eyes of Your Spirit**Scripture Focus:**

- Ephesians 1:17–18
- 2 Kings 6:17
- 1 John 1:5

Summary:

Paul’s prayer for the Ephesians is not for material needs but for **spiritual vision**. He asks that “the eyes of their understanding be enlightened.” Just as Elisha’s servant’s eyes were opened to see the angel armies, we too must **see the unseen realm** to walk in authority.

Believers often function far below their inheritance because they are spiritually blind. The teaching encourages us to pray for the eyes of our imagination to be flooded with divine light, so that we no longer live under fear, defeat, or deception.

Key Teaching Points:

- Spiritual vision changes how you live in the natural.
- God’s light exposes lies and empowers clarity.
- Your spiritual eyes must be trained, not ignored.

Takeaway:

“Faith doesn’t deny reality—it sees a greater one.”

5. Your Union with Christ Is Your Power Source**Scripture Focus:**

- Ephesians 2:6

- 1 Corinthians 6:17
- Colossians 1:27

Summary:

The relationship between a believer and Christ is likened to **marriage**—deep, permanent union. The Holy Spirit does not visit you occasionally; He indwells your spirit permanently. However, His influence is limited unless you invite Him to flood your soul, your personality, and ultimately your body.

You are His temple. But unless you surrender your will and emotions, the Spirit stays trapped inside, unable to flow out. The sermon urges us to **consciously yield to the Holy Spirit daily**.

Key Teaching Points:

- Your power is not in emotion but in union.
- You can't live a victorious life with a divided soul.
- Marriage with Christ demands daily participation.

Takeaway:

“He fits like a glove in your spirit—but He wants access to your soul.”

6. The Full Armor – Dressed to Confront Darkness

Scripture Focus:

- Ephesians 6:10–18
- Romans 13:12
- Isaiah 54:17

Summary:

This section focuses on the armour of God—not as metaphorical accessories but as **real spiritual weapons**. Each piece (truth, righteousness, gospel of peace, shield of faith, helmet of salvation, sword of the Spirit) represents an area of spiritual discipline and surrender.

Wearing the armour is equivalent to **putting on Christ**. It's not about yelling at demons—it's about being immovable, rooted in Christ. Fear is a weapon of the enemy, but when clothed in armour, **you become untouchable**.

Key Teaching Points:

- Armour is not optional—it's essential.

- Wearing partial armor leads to spiritual vulnerability.
- Armor is for advancement, not just protection.

Takeaway:

“Don’t just learn the armor—live it.”

7. Faith Is a Discipline, Not a Feeling

Scripture Focus:

- Hebrews 11:6
- Joshua 1:8
- Philippians 4:19

Summary:

Faith is not a mystical force or momentary hype. It is a discipline developed through **intentional meditation** on God's Word. The sermon teaches us to “make appointments” with God—just as you would with a mentor or bank manager.

By meditating on specific scriptures related to your situation, faith rises, doubt breaks, and direction becomes clear. God speaks—but He often waits for your preparation first.

Key Teaching Points:

- Meditating the Word transforms your thoughts and outcomes.
- Faith must be fed or it will fail.
- Speak the Word aloud to activate power.

Takeaway:

“You don’t need more faith—you need focused faith.”

8. No More Fear – You’ve Been Delivered

Scripture Focus:

- 2 Timothy 1:7
- Romans 8:15
- 2 Corinthians 2:11

Summary:

Fear is not just an emotion—it's a spirit, and it's not from God. Demons gain access through fear, offense, and unforgiveness. The message explains that many believers unknowingly give the devil a foothold by entertaining bitterness or feeling powerless.

Deliverance begins by **renouncing fear and walking in boldness**. The sermon also discusses how forgiveness and healing the soul are essential for freedom.

Key Teaching Points:

- Fear is often disguised as caution, but it breeds paralysis.
- Offense is a spiritual trap—release others and walk free.
- God can't answer prayers from a bitter heart.

Takeaway:

“Forgive quickly. Fear nothing. Walk free.”

9. Practical Faith – Asking, Hearing, Moving**Scripture Focus:**

- Matthew 7:7–8
- Isaiah 55:11
- 1 John 5:14–15

Summary:

God wants to be involved in your daily life. Whether it's provision for a house, healing, or direction, He invites you to ask boldly, listen quietly, and act decisively. The Holy Spirit gives divine impressions, scriptures, and inner knowing.

Faith isn't about begging—it's about **standing in agreement with God's Word**. You must learn to write down what God says, stand on it, and speak it repeatedly.

Key Teaching Points:

- God still speaks—are you listening?
- Faith is made complete through action.
- The Word must be declared, not just studied.

Takeaway:

“When God gives a Word, speak it until it moves the mountain.”

10. Stand in the Power of His Might

Scripture Focus:

- Ephesians 6:10
- Romans 8:37
- Isaiah 60:1

Summary:

This final charge is a call to action: **get out of survival mode and into victory mode.** Many believers are stuck in cycles of shame, doubt, and fatigue. But Christ's explosive power is inside of us, ready to be activated.

The key? **Awareness of union, ownership of the Word, and rejection of fear.** The time to sit and survive is over. It's time to arise, shine, and walk in boldness.

Key Teaching Points:

- You are not trying to win—you've already won.
- Boldness is your portion. Shame is not.
- The devil fears a believer who knows their authority.

Takeaway:

"Don't pray for victory—pray from it."
