Sermon Recap

Chapter 1: A Gathering of Strength

Good morning, and welcome. In this sacred place we call our spiritual home, we come together not merely as attendees but as family. It is here, in this divinely appointed community, that we find our part in God's kingdom—a place of worship, encouragement, and mutual edification. We gather to lift each other up, to appreciate the unique gifts that God has imparted to us, and to prepare ourselves to be expressions of Christ in our daily lives.

This place is more than a sanctuary; it is the fortification of our spirits. It's where we receive the strength and joy to return to the world bearing light, kindness, and truth. As my son once shared from his own experience in a trucking firm, kindness and love are contagious. When he began speaking life and love in his workplace, the culture transformed. The workers began to greet each other warmly and refer to him, affectionately, as the "pastor of trucking." This is the power of letting God out—it changes the atmosphere entirely.

We must remember that God is not distant. He is within us. And as scripture reminds us, *Greater is He that is in you than he who is in the world.* Why, then, should we fear the threats or negativity around us? The Lord is a warrior—Yahweh is His name. We are not called to live as victims but as victors, as warriors walking in the already-won victory of Christ.

Chapter 2: The Shift from Victim to Victor

The transformation begins in the mind. Only you can change your mindset from one of defeat to one of triumph. The scriptures declare that everything necessary for life has already been deposited within us (2 Peter 1:3). In Corinthians, it reiterates that all we need has been given. The problem, then, is not with availability—it's with alignment.

If we believe ourselves to be in lack, despite God's promise of provision, we are in disagreement with His Word. He says, *I am your Shepherd; you shall not want.* When we claim otherwise, we are siding with the circumstance, not with the Truth. That's not to ignore reality but to realign our confession with God's perspective.

Romans 14:17 tells us that the Kingdom of God is not about material needs but about righteousness, peace, and *joy* in the Holy Spirit. This joy is not passive; it is our strength. But if we let depression and hopelessness take root, it becomes a slippery slope toward isolation and despair. The devil aims to steal our confession because, as James 3 reveals, the tongue directs the course of our lives.

Chapter 3: The Battle for the Soul

The battlefield is the soul. A traumatized soul, one that has been pierced by betrayal, failure, or offense, struggles to perceive hope or goodness. We know this instinctively—just as a doctor asks what’s wrong before diagnosing, our soul cries out when it is in turmoil.

The Bible is clear: the issue is in your soul. And while you may be born again, with the Holy Spirit alive in your spirit, He still knocks—this time on your soul. He asks permission to enter and restore, to heal what has been wounded and to bring vitality back to your innermost being.

Your spirit and soul are deeply intertwined. As God breathed life into Adam and he became a living soul, so too does our soul hold immense significance in our spiritual walk. The spirit may be strong, but an unhealed soul can weaken your ability to walk in power and peace.

Chapter 4: Permission to Heal

God will not override your will. You must give the Holy Spirit permission to move from your spirit into your soul, bringing with Him resurrection power to heal and restore. The promise of 3 John 2—*I pray that you may prosper and be in good health, even as your soul prospers*—hinges on this permission.

When overwhelmed by despair, Proverbs 4:20–23 gives us the remedy: the Word of God is medicine to all our flesh. But it must be found. You will only seek it if you believe it’s there, and you’ll only believe if you know it’s available.

So ask. Ask the Holy Spirit to flood your soul with healing, to remove every blockage that prevents eternal life from manifesting fully in you. That is the abundant life Jesus speaks of in John 10:10—more life than you know what to do with, so much that you begin to give it away.

Chapter 5: Pierced Souls and Porcupines

Many of us walk around like spiritual porcupines—wounded by offenses, betrayals, letdowns, and failures. Each wound is like a spear in our soul. But God never meant for us to carry these wounds. He calls us to healing, to lay down our anger before the sun sets, and to reclaim the life that is ours in Him.

Don't live as a counterfeit version of yourself. Don't let the enemy rob you of your joy and vitality. Live the life God gave you—healed, whole, and free.

Chapter 6: Gird Up for Victory

Peter writes, *Gird up the loins of your mind, be sober, and hope to the end for the grace that is brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ.*” This call is a military term. We are to brace ourselves with the mindset of a victor, not a victim. The battle has already been won. Our job now is to enforce the victory.

Circumstances may scream fear and hopelessness, but we must not let them take root. Whatever we believe, we plant in our soul. And if what we plant contradicts God, it will slowly erode our peace like termites hollowing out a house from within.

Let peace rule in your soul, not as an intellectual concept, but as a supernatural truth brought to life by the Holy Spirit.

Chapter 7: Weakness Transformed, Power Released

We are not abandoned in weakness. In fact, it is in our weakness that God's strength is perfected. As the Apostle Paul said, *I glory in my weaknesses, for when I am weak, then I am strong.*” But how do we cross that threshold from weakness into divine strength? We ask. We ask the Holy Spirit to strengthen us—and He does. Not by might. Not by power. But by the Spirit of the Living God.

We have been born again. We are new creations in Christ, filled with the Spirit, called into partnership with Him. And the more we consciously involve Him in every area of our lives, the more the nature of Christ is revealed through us.

This partnership is not passive. It is active, assertive, and filled with authority. We are enforcers in the Kingdom of God. Say it aloud: *In Jesus name, I am an enforcer in the Kingdom of God. I walk in the dominion of Jesus Christ over every opposition to God's purpose for my life, for my family, for my city, and for my nation.*”

Chapter 8: Word on Assignment

Every word that proceeds from the mouth of God is not idle—it is on assignment. It carries divine purpose. And when we align our speech with His word, we reassign that purpose, renewing its power in the earth.

The spiritual realm responds to the voice of faith. *Angels*, the messengers of God, are awaiting the release of His word from our lips—words spoken in belief, not doubt. When we speak God's Word in faith, angels move into action. Heaven listens. Hell trembles.

God cannot bypass us. He has chosen to work through human vessels. Angels cannot preach the Gospel. We must. As John Wesley so powerfully stated, *God does nothing but in answer to prayer.*” If we do not engage with His purpose, we stifle His movement in our lives.

Chapter 9: Storm-Tested Faith

Consider the disciples on the Sea of Galilee. They were given a divine instruction: *Go to the other side.*” Yet a storm arose, and they panicked. Meanwhile, Jesus slept. Why? Because He trusted the word He spoke.

He had not spoken His own words, but the Father's. That word— *Go to the other side*”—carried divine destination, purpose, and authority. When He was awakened, Jesus didn't respond to the storm; He challenged their faith: *Where is your trust?*”

If we do not understand the Word of the Kingdom, we will not experience its results. We must believe in our heart and confess with our mouth. The Word of God will not fail—but it must be activated through faith.

Chapter 10: Words with Soul

Scripture says, *Out of the abundance of the heart, the mouth speaks.*” Words without engagement are like wind. But words spoken from the soul—with intensity, emotion, conviction—carry power, either for life or for death.

The angels of God and the enemy alike are listening for words spoken with soul. These are the creative words. If I speak hopelessness with intensity, I authorize greater oppression. Like General Custer miscalculating his enemy's strength, I can charge into spiritual disaster by underestimating the consequences of my words.

We must learn to speak life and light. Ephesians warns us not to let any profane language come out of our mouths. Such speech attracts darkness—like blood in the water attracts sharks.

Let your speech be *edifying, uplifting, instructional, and directional*. Where are your words taking you?

Chapter 11: A Date with Destiny

In the depths of the earth, working two miles underground in a coal mine, I found myself at a turning point. Surrounded by miners speaking fear and limitation, planning retirement amid uncertainty, I declared, *I won't be here when I retire. I've got a date with destiny.*"

They looked at me, puzzled. But I knew, even then, that this was not my final place. I didn't know God yet, but I knew there was more. That "more" became clear the day I met Jesus.

As a child, I stood on a concrete pillar and looked out over Sydney's lights. I sensed that I had something to give every one of those homes. I didn't know what it was—until Jesus showed me it was the *light of the Gospel*. That was my destiny. And it is in Christ that destiny is revealed and fulfilled.

Chapter 12: Soul Surgery

The soul is the seat of the wound. We've been pierced—betrayals, failures, offenses. But the Holy Spirit is our surgeon. We must give Him permission to remove the fiery darts and heal our soul.

Ezekiel 22:30 says, *I sought for a man among them to build up the wall and stand in the gap before Me for the land, that I should not destroy it, but I found none.*" When God finds no intercessor, no partner in the earth, destruction comes by default. Not because God desires it, but because no one took responsibility to stand in the gap.

Don't speak death over your life. Don't declare your own grave. Speak the promise: *I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, to give you a future and a hope*" (Jeremiah 29:11).

Chapter 13: Responsibility and Reformation

We all feel hunger. But unless someone takes the initiative to cook, no one eats. Likewise, transformation requires someone to take responsibility.

If you want out of your current situation, don't talk like a prisoner digging his own grave. Talk like a warrior standing in the gap. God is looking for one—just one—who will believe, who will pray, who will declare, who will act. Be that one.

Chapter 14: From Victimhood to Victory

You can't change what has already happened—but you can change how you respond to it. That shift begins the moment you take personal responsibility. God is always looking for someone who will say, *Here I am, Lord. Show me.*” It is not enough to complain or ask for escape. Instead, yield. Surrender your situation to God and ask, “What do You want me to do next?”

Even when the land is in famine—just as Isaac experienced—God can command prosperity. When Isaac obeyed and stayed in the land, God blessed him with a hundredfold return. The blessing was not in moving—it was in obeying. Just as with Elijah at the Brook Cherith, or Jonah being redirected to Nineveh, God's purpose often comes with a *place* attached.

If you're in the wrong place—spiritually, mentally, or even geographically—yield. God's power flows where His will is followed. When we keep trying to do it our own way, we often remain in frustration. But when we stop resisting and surrender to God's plan, things change.

Chapter 15: Giants and Grasshoppers

The ancient Israelites saw giants in the land and said, *We were like grasshoppers in their sight and in our own.*” The problem wasn't the giants—it was their own perception. The more they spoke of their problems, the bigger those problems became.

Words matter. When we speak defeat, fear, and lack, we empower those very forces. The devil's greatest weapon is *deception*. As Isaiah 14 shows us, one day the world will look upon the devil and say, *Is this the one who made the earth tremble?*”—because his power lies not in might but in lies.

You are not cut off—unless you believe you are. God's plans for you are good (Jeremiah 29:11). And if you are where He's placed you, He can send ravens to provide for you. Provision is never the issue—alignment is.

Chapter 16: Rebuilding the Walls

In intercession, we rebuild what has been broken. Our salvation is a fortress, a city with walls and gates. When those walls are breached—through sin, wounds, or neglect—we become vulnerable. But through intercessory prayer, we can restore those defenses.

James 5:16 tells us that the *effectual, fervent prayer of a righteous person avails much*. When we pray for others, we're not just petitioning—we're activating divine power. But that power is only released when our soul is engaged and our spirit is aligned with the Holy Spirit.

Faith is not passive. It is expectation. Hebrews 11 is full of people who activated the supernatural through their faith. Faith bridges the natural and the divine. Even a humble housewife, armed with nothing but obedience and a tent peg, brought down an enemy commander. When faith acts, giants fall.

Chapter 17: No More Excuses

God's invitations are often met with excuses. Just like in Gideon's day, thousands are *disqualified by distraction*. They're too busy with business, pleasure, or personal affairs. When the call of the Spirit comes, they say, “Not now.”

But God is still calling. He sends for the willing—those in the highways and hedges—to fill His house. Don't be too busy for destiny. Stay sharp. Stay available. The Holy Spirit will meet you when you pray with a righteous heart and covenant understanding.

Chapter 18: Angels on Assignment

Say it aloud: *Angels are assigned to me.*” Hebrews 1:14 tells us that angels are *ministering spirits sent to serve those who will inherit salvation*. They are not myths—they are messengers, warriors, and protectors. Throughout scripture, angels appear to break chains, deliver messages, rescue from shipwrecks, and bring provision.

Loneliness is a lie. It’s not just an emotion—it’s a spirit that seeks to isolate and weaken. But you are never alone. You are surrounded by help from heaven. Declare it: *Angels assigned to me—go now in Jesus’ name.*”

Chapter 19: Formed for a Purpose

Jeremiah 1 echoes the message of Psalm 139: *Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you.*” You were designed with intention. You were sanctified before you ever breathed your first breath.

But what was Jeremiah’s hesitation? *I cannot speak, for I am a child.*” It always comes back to words. The enemy wants you silent or careless with your speech. But God is calling you to speak life, purpose, and destiny.

Words matter. They form our world. Rhetoric without heart is noise—but when your heart is in your words, they carry spiritual weight. Offense, bitterness, and hatred—those are words that kill. But words of truth and faith build, heal, and restore.

Chapter 20: Co-Laboring with the Spirit

The Holy Spirit is your helper—not your laborer. He won’t do your job for you, but He will empower you as you step forward. If you ask Him to move a chair, nothing will happen—until you bend down to lift it. Then He strengthens you.

It is a divine partnership. God invites us into the work of faith, and in return, He releases power, peace, and provision. But it starts with taking responsibility.

Give Him your fear, your anxiety, your passivity. He says: *Cast all your cares upon Me.*” Then stand up. Straighten your shoulders. Lift your head. Fill your mouth with the words of life—words that open heaven’s supply.

Chapter 21: On Divine Assignment

Jeremiah tried to object: *I am only a child.*” But God said, *Say not, I am a child. For you will go where I send you and speak what I command you.*” Once again—words are the key.

We are all on assignment. Whether you’re a CEO or a janitor, a parent or a pastor, a student or a laborer—God has placed you with purpose. Ephesians 6 tells us not to despise our current position but to do everything *as unto the Lord*. The reward is not in your status—it’s in your attitude.

Work like you’re working for God—because you are. He will exalt you in due time.

Chapter 22: Speak It, Shift It

The Holy Spirit doesn't just comfort—He empowers. The moment we align our words with God's promises, provision is activated. *Nothing is too hard for the Lord*. Don't limit this to Jeremiah the prophet; the same Spirit that spoke through him lives in every believer today.

That Spirit carries wisdom, knowledge, discernment, miracles, healing, prophecy, faith—the full dynamic power of God. The triune God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—is at work *in you*. The authority and presence of Heaven walk with those who say, *Here I am, Lord*."

As soon as you acknowledge your footsteps are ordered by the Lord, Deuteronomy 28 begins to manifest in your life. *Blessed in your going out and your coming in*. If you believe it, speak it. That's when it becomes real.

Chapter 23: Praise in the Ordinary

Even in the mundane—in dishwashing, mowing lawns, daily chores—praise matters. Attitude blocks or unlocks blessing. When you detest the task, the frustration multiplies. But when you *praise* through the task, the atmosphere shifts.

You may not like your job. You may dislike your routine. But God is in your day—if you let Him in. *Praise God while washing dishes*, and suddenly, the kitchen becomes a sanctuary.

Every step of your day can be holy ground if your heart stays aligned. Whether you're a housewife, a worker, a student—there is no lesser calling. The housewife builds the home; the intercessor builds the Kingdom. Every role carries eternal weight when surrendered to God.

Chapter 24: Sent, Not Wandering

Say it aloud: *I do not go where I m not sent*." Life becomes powerful and purposeful when you realize you're *sent*. God sends you. And when He sends you, He sends angels ahead of you. They lower the mountains, fill the valleys, guard your going and your coming.

But if you're not speaking this—if you're not giving your angels assignments—they wait idle. Angels are powerful, but they act on God's Word spoken in faith. No command, no movement.

Chapter 25: Commissioned and Covered

Jeremiah was told, *Do not be afraid of their faces, for I am with you to deliver you*." When you walk in obedience, even the enemy sees the glory on you. Deuteronomy 28 says people will *fear your presence* because they recognize God's mark.

You may not see it, but the enemy does: angelic warriors flanking you, Heaven's banner over you. Yahweh Himself stands with you—*LORD*, in all caps. The name above every name.

God has *set you over nations and kingdoms*—to uproot, tear down, destroy, and then build and plant. This is not symbolic. It is spiritual reality. Faith moves mountains—and pulls down strongholds.

Chapter 26: Faith That Pulls Heaven Down

Hebrews 11 recounts the legacy of faith: Gideon, Barak, Samson, David, Samuel, the prophets. *Faith conquered kingdoms, shut lions' mouths, quenched flames, raised the dead, empowered the weak.*

Faith *pulled armies from another realm* into battle formation. These weren't fantasy tales—they were testimonies of what faith *actually does*. Women received their dead back through resurrection. Martyrs suffered gladly, knowing a greater resurrection awaited.

They endured caves, wilderness, beatings, sword, and shame—all because they *saw the invisible*. And now, God invites us into *even more*: the fullness of faith, perfection through Christ, and partnership in His final works.

Chapter 27: Armies from Another Realm

Armies from another realm—pulled into battle by faith. Elisha's servant panicked when he saw the Syrian army. But Elisha said, *Open his eyes, Lord.*” And suddenly, the servant saw what the natural eyes could not: chariots of fire, armies of God encamped all around.

Spiritual vision changes everything.

The greatest power on the planet is not military might—it's *intercessory prayer*. When you pray in faith, you activate Kingdom dominion. The unseen becomes seen. Angelic armies align. Darkness flees.

Chapter 28: Vision of the Assignment

One moment of worship transported the author into a vision of infinite, veiled blues. In that stillness, he saw angels—layer upon layer. As he stood in awe, Jesus appeared beside him and said, *They've been assigned to you for your next assignment.*”

Suddenly, the weight of responsibility hit. If angels are assigned, then action must follow. *How do I work with them? How do I communicate? Who leads them?*

Jesus answered simply: *I do. I am the captain of this host.*”

Chapter 29: The Frightening Power Within

To realize that *God is in you* is a glorious but frightening truth. You are not God—but you are His child, equipped for His mission. You are an ambassador of Heaven. God's Kingdom is in you—and it flows through you.

But with that revelation comes responsibility. *Walk worthy of the calling*. Understand your authority. Know that when you call upon the name of Jesus, *He responds instantly*.

Chapter 30: Carriers of the Kingdom

When you finally grasp your identity—how precious you are, how powerful your words are—you stop speaking death and start speaking life.

Invite the King into your stable, and it becomes a palace. *Yes, but my place stinks*, you say. It won't for long. When you start thanking Him, you give Him permission to move. And when you give God permission, transformation begins.

Chapter 31: Invite Him In and Stand in Courage

Before anything changes in your life, you must *invite Jesus into the situation*. But invitation alone is not enough—you must also have *courage*. God's word to Joshua echoes across the generations: *Be strong and very courageous.*"

Don't be afraid of their faces. Don't live in fear of what others think or say about you—or even what you imagine they might think. Stop letting imaginary opinions control real destinies. Instead, think God's thoughts. *You are seated in Christ in heavenly places*, far above all principalities, powers, and rulers of darkness.

You've been commissioned to tear down demonic strongholds and rebuild what God has destined—just like Jeremiah: *To root out, pull down, destroy, throw down, build, and plant.*"

Chapter 32: How Territory Is Taken

God told Israel He wouldn't drive out all their enemies at once because the land would be overtaken by wild beasts. *Progression brings possession*. As you take territory, you maintain it. Through intercession, you rip up demonic strategies designed to destroy your life.

Satan's ultimate goal is to deceive you into cursing yourself. But your breakthrough begins when you respond like Paul and Silas: *pray and praise*. Praise isn't for when everything is perfect—it's what ushers in the supernatural while you're still in chains.

So declare: *I root out, pull down, destroy, and throw down every work of the enemy in Jesus name. Host of Heaven—go!*

Then you *build and plant*. Call those things that are not as though they were. That's faith in action.

Chapter 33: Dominion and National Intercession

Your authority extends beyond your own life. The Bible calls believers to *pray for those in authority*—not complain. You've been given power to influence nations. When believers pray, they release angelic armies to shift governments, dismantle evil agendas, and establish righteousness.

Righteousness exalts a nation. Prayer releases Heaven's government: *Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done.*" We are not praying to control politicians. We are aligning the spiritual atmosphere with God's plan, so the Gospel can be preached freely and souls can be saved.

Chapter 34: The Commandment to Believe

I John 3:23 issues a clear command: *Believe on the name of His Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another.*" This is not optional. And those who obey dwell in Him—and He in them.

If His word abides in you, *ask what you will and it shall be done* (John 15:7). Why? Because faith-filled words manifest God's will on earth. *Whatever comes out of your mouth will manifest*, if it's born of belief.

Faith isn't a wish thrown into a pond—it's an ignition system. You must turn the key, shift into gear, and release power.

Chapter 35: From Wishing to Believing

Faith is now. Hope is future. Wishing isn't biblical. You don't throw coins into heaven and hope something sticks. God's Word is a covenant. It's as certain as ordering something online and knowing it's in stock—yours for the taking.

Ask yourself: *Am I believing or just wishing?* Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God. You build faith through consistent, focused hearing of His Word.

Chapter 36: From Attack to Authority

The speaker recounts a personal battle with sickness after decades of health. Complacency had crept in. Like a breached wall, his protection faltered. He ended up hospitalized for 14 days.

Despite medical tests revealing nothing, he chose to walk the hospital room, confessing Isaiah 40: *Those who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength.* Pain screamed at a level of 15 out of 10—but he stood on the Word.

Eventually, a professor remarked, *I see change in you.* Not from medicine—but from *faith*. On day 14, he discharged himself—and lived to testify. *Believe in your heart, speak with your mouth, release your angels—and victory comes.*

Chapter 37: Army of Angels, Activated by Faith

Say it aloud: *I believe in my heart and I speak with my mouth.* This is not playacting. This is the divine formula of authority. You don't beg angels—you *command them* in Jesus' name, releasing armies into action (James 5:16).

The Word tells us plainly: *Romans 10:9-10, Colossians 2:6-7, Mark 11:23, Matthew 21:21, Luke 17:6.* These verses point to the same reality—*what you believe and say determines what happens.*

Chapter 38: Guardian Angels and Militant Hosts

Matthew 18:10 reveals that every person is assigned a guardian angel from birth. That angel walks with you until your final breath. But beyond the guardian are *ministering spirits*—angelic hosts assigned to assist with your destiny (Hebrews 1:14).

And when you step into *intercession*, you access *militant armies* of Heaven—ready for warfare, ready to respond.

God is waiting for people who will receive this revelation and *act on it*. Angels are not decoration—they are divine reinforcements. But they only respond to the Word of God released in faith.

Chapter 39: Protect, Plant, and Participate

As believers, we are called not only to protect our own homes but to *expand the Kingdom* through prayer and action. Once you've torn down spiritual strongholds through intercession, you must *plant*

and build. Ask yourself: What do I want to see? Healing? Restoration? Breakthrough? Then plant those promises through prayer and confession.

But prayer isn't passive. It demands *involvement*. If you're praying for someone, be prepared to *be part of the answer*. Love is not a sentiment—it's an action. If someone is hungry, feed them. If someone is in need, help wisely. If they're an addict, don't fuel their bondage—find practical, dignifying ways to lift them up.

You can't pray for someone's salvation and then refuse to speak the Gospel. Heaven won't accept that excuse. If you're praying, be ready to act. Ask God to give you courage. Ask for open doors. Then step through them.

Chapter 40: Praying for the Lost

If someone is unsaved, your role is both *intercessor* and *witness*. Tear down the spiritual resistance in prayer. Then plant seeds of salvation. If they're far from you, pray for laborers to cross their path. If they're near, ask God for divine opportunities to speak the truth in love.

Angels won't preach the Gospel—but they will prepare hearts, stir environments, and position people for divine encounters. But when that moment comes—*don't shrink back*. If fear holds you, ask God to remove it. *Jesus is a soul winner—and so are you.*

Say it aloud: *Jesus, make me a soul winner.*"

Chapter 41: The Final Prayer – From Cowardice to Courage

The final words are not a closing, but a commissioning. In prayer, we acknowledge God's kingdom, His promises, His authority—and our role in it. We are not spectators. We are warriors. And Yahweh is His name.

Let this be your declaration:

Father, thank You for Your Word. Thank You for Your kingdom. Thank You for the dominion I have through Jesus Christ. When I call upon Your name, You send angel armies to do what You promised. Your covenant, ratified in the blood of Jesus, stands eternal and unbreakable."

Remove cowardice from me. Replace it with the heart of the Lion of Judah. Give me holy boldness. In Jesus name, I take authority over fear, anxiety, stress, hopelessness, and confusion. I break every stronghold in the minds of Your people. I release the Host of Heaven, under the captaincy of Jesus Christ, to bring freedom now—wherever this word is being read."

In Jesus name, Amen. God loves you. We love you."

Epilogue: Warriors of the Kingdom
